



### Monthly Tips & Tasks

with Michael Coulter

As I write, the rain is falling – much-needed to give Spring a proper top-up of moisture in the soil before the demands of Summer arrive.

Labour Weekend is the traditional time when the soil and daytime temperatures are warm enough to plant and sow all the plants that need warmth to grow. Spring bulbs will soon finish flowering and should be left with their foliage intact to ensure blooms next season; only remove the foliage once it has fully dried off.

The weather has been warm with plenty of sunshine, and plants have been growing very well. I've noticed early signs of aphids and mildew on some of my plants, so I've sprayed for these before they become problematic. Citrus plants are now entering their growth phase, making it the ideal time to give them

a feed and check for any signs of aphids and whitefly, which can lead to sooty mould on the foliage later in the season.

Pip fruit will be in flower or just finishing. Once the petals have fallen, sprays can be applied to control codling moth, aphids, and mites; also, a fungicide for mildew and black spot sprayed this month will help with early control before disease pressure builds.

Lawns will be growing quickly now, with grass producing stalky seed heads. Fertiliser and regular mowing will keep them looking tidy. This month is also the time to plant dahlias, chrysanthemums, begonias, and gladioli – I always add any supports needed as I plant the young plants.

Tomatoes growing in the greenhouse will now be thriving; regular watering will help prevent blossom-end rot as the fruit ripens. Other indoor crops, such as chillies, peppers, and cucumbers, may benefit from weekly liquid feeds to encourage growth. Good ventilation on hot days will help keep temperatures around 25°C, reducing plant stress and keeping them healthy. Most greenhouses will also need shading during the hottest Summer months to prevent overheating.

As flowering shrubs finish blooming, prune any that need it before they start their next growth phase. This month is a busy time in the garden, with planting, weeding, and watering. It's better to get these tasks done today rather than leaving them until tomorrow, as that may be too late.

**Main Speaker: Valmai Becker** Phytofarm, Little River



In the 1980's Valmai owned The Old Shipping Office, an Akaroa restaurant popular for its provincial cuisine, artful plate design; use of herbs and edible flowers. She attained a Diploma in Naturopathy (ND) in 1980 and with this qualification she established and

managed a clinical practice for eight years, specializing in using the philosophies and traditions of natural medicine and a holistic self-healing model of wellness. She used Herbal Medicine, Nutritional and Massage Therapy to manage acute and chronic conditions.

Valmai is a well known Naturopath from her years as a clinical practitioner and her involvement in the establishment of Canterbury College of Natural Medicine (CCNM). With her passion for Natural Medicine as the course director, she wrote curriculum to New Zealand Qualifications Authority standard for the Diploma programmes taught at the college and was a teacher in many aspects of Natural Medicine.

Phytofarm is now her primary passion, where she brings together a number of her skills: gardener, teacher, learner and care taker of 10 acres of forest and gardens.

Mini Speaker: Dr John Clemens AHRIH

John Clemens is a horticulturist and landscape ecologist who has worked with plants, gardens, and nurseries in the UK, Australia and – for almost 40 years – in New Zealand. He was awarded an Associate of Honour by the Royal NZ Institute of Horticulture in 2023 for teaching, research, and advice to the horticultural industry. He was Curator of the Christchurch Botanic Gardens. He currently works as a Biosecurity Advisor (Special Projects) for Environment Canterbury. In this talk he will introduce you to today's "special project": how we can work together to minimise the impact of pest plants in our gardens and neighbourhoods. #### Plant of the Month - Acers





Acers, commonly known as Japanese Maples are a fantastic addition to any garden for their beauty, versatility, and low maintenance requirements.

One of their main attractions is the stunning foliage, which offers vibrant colours throughout the year. During spring and summer leaves come in shades of green, red or purple and in autumn, they transition into fiery hues of orange, gold and crimson, creating a dramatic seasonal display.

These trees are idea for both small and large gardens due to their compact size and slow growth rate. With a variety of forms ranging from upright to weeping, Acers can fit in any garden style, whether traditional, modern or Japanese inspired. They also thrive well in containers, making them suitable for patios or balconies.

Beyond aesthetics, Acers are relatively easy to care for. They prefer partial shade, well drained, soil and sheltered spots protected from strong winds. Once established, they require minimal pruning and are resistant to pests and diseases.

Additionally, Acers promote biodiversity offering habitat and food for insects and birds. These trees also have symbolic and emotional appeal in Japanese culture. They are associated with peace, renewal and tranquillity, making them perfect for creating serene garden spaces. Whether used as a focal point or part of a border. Acers bring elegance, seasonal interest, and ecological benefits, making them worthwhile investment for nay gardener looking to enhance their outdoor space. A few of my favourites are:

Acer pal Beni Hime - Ideal bonsai or container. Compact dwarf maple with tiny bright red leaves. Acer pal Chishio - Tub or front border. Small flame pink leaves in Spring turning coppery salmon. Acer pal. Scolopendrifolium - Strong growing upright bush tree, long narrow bright green leaves Ht 4m. Acer pal. Orangeola - Smaller rounder dissected foliage, freely branching habit weeping. New spring growth dark orange-red turning bronze-red with green undertones in Summer/Autumn bright Scarlet-Orange Ht 1-3m
