

Monthly Tips & Tasks

with Michael Coulter

The weather over the Christmas period was not very summer-like. Below-average temperatures, dull, cloudy days, and double the usual rainfall made gardening quite a challenge. The silver lining for me was the excellent crops of raspberries, strawberries, and blackcurrants.

Tomatoes have been slow to ripen, and my stone fruit was small and eaten by blackbirds. On the positive side, the lawns have stayed green, so I treated them for weeds and applied a slow-release fertiliser to keep them going through the rest of summer.

Plant growth has been vigorous in the trees and shrubs, so a summer prune will help keep them in shape. There has been less damage from the usual insect pests, but as the weather starts to warm up, keep an eye out for aphids, mites, and caterpillars. The humid conditions have encouraged mildew, rust, and botrytis fungi, so now is the time to use preventive sprays. Always remember to follow withholding periods for sprays on fruit and vegetables, and ensure all produce, whether from your garden or the store, is washed before use.

Spring bulbs that have dried off can now be lifted and cleaned, ready for replanting in autumn. Doing this every few years helps keep them healthy and vigorous. Perennials have enjoyed the conditions and are providing one of the best flower displays I've seen in years. Later perennials are growing strongly and will need support when they bloom.

In the **vegetable garden**, it's a busy time harvesting many spring-planted crops, while also preparing for the planting of winter crops. Brassicas will require close attention to

keep them growing well in the warmer days and to watch for the white butterfly. Once the stone fruit harvest is over, I like to apply a fungicide for long-term control of leaf curl and botrytis.

The **flower garden** is in full bloom, and removing spent flowers will keep the display looking its best and encourage successive flowering.

As for weeds—this year has been a battle! I've found that two hours in the morning with a hoe, tackling them while they're small, is the easiest way to stay on top of them.



Main Speaker: Colin Meurk Xeric Gardens

Xeric gardening focuses on growing droughttolerant plants to conserve water and thrive in arid conditions. Colin will talk about creating appealing native gardens that are adapted to local and ever-changing conditions - without incurring excess water charges.

Dr. Colin Meurk, ONZM, is a distinguished New Zealand ecologist renowned for his contributions to ecological restoration and urban ecology. He holds adjunct positions at both Canterbury and Lincoln Universities and serves as a Research Associate at Manaaki Whenua – Landcare Research. Dr. Meurk's work encompasses applied biogeography, landscape dynamics, and conservation biology. He has been instrumental in

projects such as the ecological restoration of Christchurch's Travis Wetland and the development of the Christchurch 360 Trail. In recognition of his services to ecological restoration, he was appointed an Officer of the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2021.

Colin is the Honorary Botanist for the Canterbury Horticultural Society.





Plant of the Month -Laurus nobilis The Bay Tree

Every garden deserves a Bay Tree – the rewards are many.

Bay was the ceremonial laurel the ancient Greeks and Romans who bestowed wreaths of bay as crowns for accomplished athletes, warrior heroes or poets.

Sweet bay, or bay laurel is the name given to this perennial evergreen tree which grows, very slowly.

Bay leaves are shiny, smooth and dark with a strong aromatic scent. The flowers are a creamy-yellow and fruits that follow are purple.



An ideal container plant, clip to maintain their shape or if planted in the garden choose a sunny position. Bay Trees can be planted as a specimen tree or they make a fabulous hedge.

Culinary use – Bay is one of the three herbs

used in bouquet garni, the 'broth posy' used to flavour cooking. Use to flavour meat and vegetables, soup and stews, add a bay leaf when poaching fish.

Medicinal use – drink for indigestion and headaches

Bay leaves can be harvested at any time of year – use immediately or dry before storing.

In our shrub area we have topiaries and chunky ball shaped Bays.
